After an intense audition process which included submitting photos and videos of her cooking and being selected from thousands of applications to attend an in-person audition, Bella made to the top 40 who were asked to cook for the chance to receive a place on the show.

"It really was a lengthy journey to receiving an apron, but it taught me a lot about myself and served as good preparation for the competition ahead," Bella said.

Bella has been cooking for as long as she can remember and was encouraged to value and enjoy home cooking by her mum and Nonna.

"I have Italian heritage so a lot of our traditions centre around sharing food. We make hundreds of bottles of tomato passata together every summer so that we have enough to last the whole year."

Baking is Bella's particular niche and desserts have undoubtedly become her specialty, as she demonstrated on *MasterChef*.

"I love making anything sweet; from ice creams to choux pastries, tarts, cakes and everything in between. My way to show someone I care about them is to give them a tin of freshly baked cookies or a box of homemade chocolates."

The highlight of her time on *MasterChef* was the opportunity to connect with 23 likeminded home cooks who had such a variety of life experiences and wanted to spend every minute of every day cooking, eating, learning and sharing their knowledge about food.

"This experience has come with so many learning curves and life lessons! I've realised that it's in the moments where you feel like giving up that you can grow the most," Bella said.

So what is next in Bella's culinary journey?

"I'll definitely keep following my passion for making desserts and hopefully turn that into a small business one day. I know I have a lot still to learn so I'd love to get some experience with some pastry chefs around Melbourne. I feel so excited by the endless possibilities of where this next chapter may lead."

My passion was the IVF field, so when a job came up at Monash IVF for a "Specimen Reception" role, I was hopeful this would be my foot in the door - and it was.

This was the beginning of a 17-year career at Monash IVF, starting at Specimen Reception, then moving to Andrology and Endocrinology, and eventually Embryology. Embryology is "real science" - hands on, microscopic work, fine motor skills and extreme attention to detail. I loved the patient interaction, the team environment and the technical application of the role.

I left Monash IVF in 2017 and had a year off work before returning to run the donor program for Newlife IVF. My favourite memories from OLSH are sitting in class, genuinely happy to be there. Science labs, French conjugations, Italian conversations - I loved it all. The friendships I made and the teachers who encouraged my curiosity shaped me more than I realised at the time.

I completed a Bachelor of Science at Monash, majoring in Computer Science, which opened the door to a corporate career. I worked for some incredible organisations including L'Oréal, Country Road, Lion Co, Mondelēz International, and most recently Nike Pacific - with stints in Geneva and San Francisco. Those French lessons with Madame Lesur came in handy!

Then COVID arrived and like so many of us, it prompted a reset. With two toddlers and Melbourne in lockdown, my husband and I made the move to Beechworth, a beautiful little town in north-east Victoria.

Last year I took over Beechworth Coffee Roasters, a small local roastery and it's been one of the most unexpected joys of my life. I roast on a 5kg Roastmax, a machine that uses both convection and conduction heat to transform green beans into something beautiful. What I didn't expect was how much it would connect back to those Physics classes – thank you Mr Liston! In an age where AI is reshaping so many industries, there's something deeply grounding about mastering a craft by touch, sight and sound.

My husband and I run the roastery and love the connection it brings to the community. When we arrived, there was no basketball program for kids, so I started one. Called *Beats & Bounce*, it brings children together to learn basketball skills and drills set to their favourite music. We're heading into our third season and I couldn't be prouder.

OLSH gave me curiosity, confidence and community. My advice is to stay open - some of the best chapters of my life started with a detour I didn't choose.

After graduating from OLSH, I completed a Bachelor of Arts (Honours)/Bachelor of Laws (Honours) at university. My studies in Criminology and Law introduced me to the significant challenges victim survivors of family, domestic, and sexual violence face within the legal system, as well as the mechanisms available to drive meaningful change. This growing passion for advocacy ultimately led me to complete a Doctor of Philosophy in Criminology.

My work has focused on how police, practitioners and courts respond to different forms of family, domestic, and sexual violence. My career highlights include receiving two international awards, advising the United Nations Population Fund, working on a book, and attending international conferences across Europe, the United States, Australia and Aotearoa New Zealand. I work as a Research Fellow at the Monash Gender and Family Violence Prevention Hub, evaluating responses to family violence, co designing innovative prevention programs, and developing training for frontline services.

I spent two and a half years at OLSH after completing my early high school years in Aotearoa. I look back on my time at OLSH fondly and remain friends with several people from my cohort. At school I worked hard and developed a strong work ethic and a passion for the social sciences – both of which continue to shape my career today.

My advice to current students is to approach the world with an open mind, but not an empty head. Life is about creating opportunities and saying yes to the ones that align with your direction and values. The things I've said yes to – even when I've felt imposter syndrome – have helped me build a strong network, find brilliant mentors, and gain valuable life experiences. People will remember you if you have a good sense of humour and treat others with kindness. It pays off.

News in brief



1 Cleaning up our local reserve

Our student leaders participated in *Clean Up Australia* day by heading over to Hodgson Reserve with bags, tongs and gloves in hand to pick up rubbish. They found everything from cans, to food wrappers, and even drones, and spent the afternoon collecting and tallying each piece of litter they picked up. They filled six large bags with 636 pieces of rubbish in total!

By far, the biggest contributors were food wrappers, followed by cigarette butts and small torn pieces of paper and plastic. Sustainability Captain Imogen said "After all our work, we were exhausted but proud of what we had managed to do, covering the whole park in under two hours! It felt great to do something sustainable for the community, and I had so many girls tell me how much they enjoyed it. Some were even planning a second outing!"

2 Opening Mass

3 Biomechanics in action

Our Year 12 Physical Education students recently visited URBNSURF to participate in a "Learn to Surf" lesson as part of their Skill Acquisition and Biomechanics unit. As beginner surfers, they explored how body positioning and timing influence successful wave riding while applying various principles of biomechanics. The controlled wave environment allowed students to practice and refine their technique while receiving feedback from instructors.
