ach year our OLSH community raises around \$30,000 to support a range of projects including the work of the OLSH Sisters through their overseas aid, Caritas Australia, the local chapter of Vinnies Australia and the St Kilda food van. From providing food for a stall or working to plan an activity, to buying a raffle ticket or making a donation – these combined efforts create such a wonderful capacity to support others and for this we are grateful.

Our recent Lenten Appeal raised nearly \$6,000 for the OLSH Sisters Overseas Aid and Caritas Australia's *Project Compassion*. Many of the activities contributing to these funds were led by students, planning and organising the logistics of each activity and generating support to ensure their success. As well as making a difference for others, these activities are a great opportunity for students to work together, developing their leadership skills and building our OLSH spirit.









Celebrating our VCE achievers

We welcomed back our 2023 VCE students for the VCE Ceremony of Excellence, recognising achievement and growth by students who completed a VCE subject in 2023.

We celebrated the sixteen students with ATAR scores of 90, including our College Dux Mary Moss (98.95) and Proxime Accessit Halle Schroor (97.85). Mary's perfect subject scores of 50 for Art Creative Practice and Art Making and Exhibiting were also recognised.

Six students whose ATAR represented significant academic growth were recognised with the Principal's Award and the fifty-eight study scores of 40 and above were celebrated.

We were grateful to hear from College Dux Mary Moss and VCE achiever Amelia Melita, who shared their wisdom and reflections on their VCE experience. They spoke of choosing subjects that ignited their passions and inspired them to achieve excellence, and of taking with them their connection to being people of Heart as they pursue new pathways.

Six decades of friendship

When past students return to OLSH for reunions, we often hear of friendship groups that have remained strong over decades or that have been reconnected through reunions, life events or chance meetings. Recently we heard from a group of six students from the Class of 1964 whose friendship spans six decades.

Starting at the College in 1959, at a time when Patterson station had just been built and the footprint of the school was still expanding, Mary McSweeney, Bernadette O'Brien, Julie Hall, Kathryn Child and Patricia Phillips made the transition to secondary school together. Lesley Best joined them in 1964 for her final year of secondary schooling and the group of six were formed.

Their shared memories included the teachers who inspired a love of French, the arts and literature; creating their own version of hockey played on the tennis courts; wielding the industrial floor polisher around the hall at the end of term; and throwing their velour hats and gloves in the air on the last day of school.

During their final year at the College, they were all Prefects and House Captains, which afforded them privileges such as access to the loudspeaker. One day, with Melbourne in the grip of Beatlemania due to the band's visit to Australia, the girls took over the loud speaker at lunchtime to play Beatles songs. They watched as students swarmed the grounds to track down the source of the music and join in singing.

In the decades since leaving the College the group, who affectionately call themselves *The Frantics* reflecting their shared love of all things French, have stayed connected and shared a lifetime of family events, career highlights, interests and travel. They travelled to France together in 2000 and plan to return there in 2025 to relive some of the places they enjoyed together.
